## About Us

On Point for College is a not-for-profit education and career-attainment support program. We aid individuals in overcoming barriers to post-secondary education by helping them access and succeed in college and training and certificate programs. We also help them leverage their skills and education into meaningful employment opportunities.

Our services are free, comprehensive, and holistic. They include: one-on-one advising; help with program and financial aid applications; college tours; basic college and residence hall supplies; transportation to and from college; career coaching; placement in paid internship experiences; and much more. We strive to help with every step of the journey, from application through graduation and beyond.

We serve both traditional (right out of high school) and non-traditional (later in life) students. The vast majority of our students who attend college are the first members of their families to do so. Many face additional barriers such as poverty, homelessness, aging out of foster care, refugee or immigrant status, or a history of court involvement. For most, a post-secondary education would be out of reach without access to the services that On Point for College provides.

Since 2018, we have served Cayuga, Herkimer, Madison, Onondaga, Oneida, and Oswego Counties. We also operate in partnership with the Goddard-Riverside Options Center and the New Settlement College Access Center to provide services and support to students in and from the New York City region.

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# On Point for College Fast Facts

#### 1999

On Point was started by founder Ginny Donohue as a volunteer effort out of the truck of her car in 1999.

#### 2012

On Point expanded to Utica, NY in 2012. Today, our Utica office oversees operations in Oneida, Madison, and Herkimer Counties, while our Syracuse office oversees operations in Onondaga, Cayuga, and Oswego Counties.

# **Our 3 Pillar Program**

Helps students achive their educational and career goals through college and other types of post-secondary training programs. It includes:

- 1) Access helping students to enroll in school, apply for financial aid, and prepare to begin school;
- 2) Success helping students to stay in school, including providing support with transferring schools and accessing on-and off-campus resources;
- 3) Career Services helping students and graduates prepare to transition to the workforce through paid internships, networking opportunities, job fairs, resume and cover letter coaching, and more.



# **Message from our Executive Director**

It's been another year of success at On Point for College! Although we have not quite returned to our pre-COVID-19 student levels, fiscal year 2021-22 was a distinct step in that direction. New student enrollment in the program increased by 19%, total student interactions remained close to all-time highs, and our Career Services program continued to attract near-record levels of interest, serving just under 1,400 students during the year.

This return to 'normalcy' was made possible, in part, by support On Point received from the cities of Syracuse and Utica. Both municipalities generously awarded a portion of their American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds towards helping On Point restore our new student recruitment pipelines, which were severely hindered by the COVID-19 pandemic and our subsequent inability to recruit students in person.

In addition to providing funds for critical student supports such as textbooks, school supplies, and math/science grants, Syracuse and Utica's ARPA investments in On Point have allowed us to secure a mass texting platform. This platform has helped raise our technological capabilities and made it considerably easier for our team to communicate with students. The City of Syracuse has also provided funding that will allow On Point to actively promote our services to city residents in hopes of recruiting them into the program.

The fiscal year also marked the beginning of our Alliance for Economic Inclusion (AEI) Round 2 grant funding. Round

1 of this grant, which On Point received from 2018-2021, allowed us to increase our outreach in Madison County and to begin offering our college access and success programs to students in Cayuga and Oswego counties. Round 2 of this funding, which is a part of New York State's \$500 million Upstate Revitalization Initiative (URI) investment in Central New York, has enabled us to expand our Career Services offerings to Cayuga and Oswego counties. We will be targeting lowincome first-generation college students and out-of-school youth and young adults.

With this funding, we have hired advisors to serve these new territories, opened an office in downtown Oswego, and dramatically increased the number of students we are serving in the region. As a reflection of this growth, 2022 marked the first time we were able to feature an Oswego County student in our annual Syracuse Celebration event. We were delighted to recognize Oswego High School graduate and Clarkson University student Abigail Faul (pictured at right) as a recipient of our 2022 Sabra Reichardt Scholar award. We look forward to honoring more students from these new counties in future events!

Another area of focus for the 2021-22 fiscal year was improving our overall financial stability. Since day one, On Point's services have been available to any student who requests them and at no cost to the student. In our nearly 25-year existence, we have expanded to serve approximately 3,000 active students across Central New York and the Mohawk Valley. This growth has been made possible, in large part, by support from various federal, state, and local governments. While government funding has been critical in helping us grow, our reliance on it also makes budget planning difficult and leaves us vulnerable to political changes.

In response to these challenges, On Point was one of only five organizations accepted

into the Rosamond Gifford Foundation's 'Embracing Disruption' program. This 15-month intensive leadership training program was designed to help participants increase organizational resiliency.

The culmination of On Point's work with the program was the development of a plan to begin to monetize some of the services we deliver to the colleges and school systems whose students we support. Although we are still in the process of implementing much of this plan, we are delighted to share that we have already signed contracts with several of the colleges, charter schools, and school districts we work with. We look forward to continuing to grow this program in coming years.



SYRACUSE OVERSEES PROGRAMS IN CAYUGA, ONONDAGA AND OSWEGO COUNTIES


On the Career Services front, we have embarked on an exciting new partnership with the City of Syracuse, Onondaga County, and other leading local institutions. The Syracuse Surge initiative is an effort to transform Syracuse into one of America's 'smartest' cities and prepare it for global leadership in the New Economy.

Made possible by investments from the JP Morgan Chase Foundation and the American Rescue Plan Act, Syracuse Surge aims to create pathways to in-demand, local careers in high-tech manufacturing. Alongside partner organizations, On Point's role in the program is to help ensure inclusive growth through talent and workforce development, minority, women, veteran, and disabled-owned (XBE) business development and community engagement.

More specifically, On Point has partnered with CenterState CEO to support a talent pipeline for their Surge Advanced Manufacturing (SAM) and Electrical Mechanical Technician (EMT) training programs. We are also working closely with Le Moyne College to recruit college-age and non-traditional students to participate in their ERIE21 and Hack Upstate programs. Once students complete these training programs, we are also working to help connect them to jobs at local high-tech employers like INFICON and Cryomech.



# **Utica Program Update**

UTICA OVERSEES PROGRAMS IN HERKIMER, MADISON, AND ONEIDA COUNTIES

Fiscal year 2021-22 was an equally exciting year for our Utica office, particularly on the fundraising front. It marked the second year of our Utica Golf for Grads Tournament, which was held at the Yahnundasis Golf Club in honor of Mike and Mary Humphrey. Despite being a relatively new event, the tournament attracted nearly a full field with 27 teams vying for the title. The event's success was driven largely by our leading sponsors, the Humphrey Family of New Hartford, Syracuse, and Chicago, beverage sponsor NBT Bank, and senior sponsor and our club host, Signal Technologies.

The event has grown each year and we were particularly excited to welcome new sponsors including the Fountainhead Group and Business Machines and Equipment (BME). On Point was also honored to be chosen to be one of BME's 2022 "Community Partners" which resulted in them coming on board as senior sponsors for both our Syracuse and Utica tournaments.

Another of the year's highlights was the mention of On Point in the pages of the Washington Post. The paper published a story entitled "When a Sudden, Small Expense Threatens an Entire College Career" on January 30 which detailed some of the challenges Utica student Giovanni "Gio" Harvey faced along his educational journey and how On Point stepped in to help.

Not to be outdone by its rival paper of record, the New York Times also featured longtime Utica advisor, LuPway Doh and his wife Sandar (pictured below from the New York Times) in a story entitled "How Refugees Transformed a Dying Rust Belt City" which was published on June 3. The article explored the contributions of various immigrants and refugee communities to the revival of Utica and also shared the story of On Point student, Pri Paw and her family.
